Austin Outdoor has completed the initial landscaping cleanup for all locations. US 1 was completed this week and the second pass on SR44 will begin on Monday. Faith Miller and company representatives will be meeting next week to discuss some renovations to the S. Causeway medians to spruce them up.

Additional utility work within the S. Peninsula right-of-way will require road closures of S. Peninsula, from the Flagler Avenue intersection to 2nd Avenue; intermittently between the dates of 5/4/15 – 5/8/15.

The TPO priority list for the “2015 Call For Projects” will be updated after the June meeting.






Charting Our Course (Public Input Phase)
Narrative

Introduction

The City of New Smyrna Beach is located in Southeast Volusia County, 15 minutes south of Daytona Beach. The City has a population of about 23,000, with the cities of Port Orange to the north and Edgewater to the south. The proximity of these other cities combined with city residents bring a trade area population estimated at exceeding 90,000. The City has been recognized as a world-class surfing destination, and tourism is a prominent driver of the local economy.

Timely

In 2013 the City had been involved in several issues and projects that became a focal point for citizens to the exclusion of larger topics. In addition, City staff was busy with projects and day to day operations. For these reasons City leaders felt the need to have a City-wide planning effort to create a visioning plan to position the City for opportunities and challenges to come, and embarked on a quest at the beginning of the 2014 calendar year to draft a 25 year vision. Dubbed "Charting Our Course", a key component of the initiative included using public input as a rudder to steer the planning process.

Innovative

Visioning is not an uncommon exercise for local governments. In Charting Our Course, this exercise utilized two methods for gathering public input that were innovative: Public

input through survey responses gathered by City staff in an “out-reach” manner at a variety of events and meetings; and public input gathered from a public forum at the conclusion of the public input process, with a nationally recognized futurist as the featured speaker to set the foundation for discussion.

To ensure a broad survey response that would include input from citizens who do not normally attend city meetings, city staff launched the program with a printed survey. The survey listed 12 general municipal issues and a line for “other”, and the survey effort lasted nearly three months. The survey was distributed and collected by city staff working in an “out-reach” mode, actively engaging citizens attending events and meetings in various areas of the City. City staff would ask citizens at the events if they could take just a few minutes to fill out a survey to provide input for the future benefit of the City. City staff attended many events including the Saturday Farmers’ Market, the Chamber of Commerce annual Home and Business Expo, the annual Black Heritage Festival, and Little League Opening Day, as well as meetings with Homeowner Associations. There was also an on-line presentation of the survey on the city website.

This outreach effort was successful, with more than 550 completed surveys collected. Distributing and collecting the surveys at a variety of venues and events brought a cross-sectional sample of resident and visitor opinions that would not have been captured through more traditional methods such as a town-hall style meeting.

News stories and paid advertisements helped to build public awareness throughout the public input process. The daily newspaper for the City, the Daytona Beach News-Journal, published four original stories from January to June, 2014. Stories included the

purpose of the initiative and engagement opportunities for citizens; quotes from citizens who participated in the process; a story on the futurist who was the featured speaker at the public forum; and the recommendations and actions steps presented to the City Commission.

The public forum was held on Saturday, March 22, 2014, and was attended by over 100 citizens, an excellent attendance figure for a public meeting on a Saturday. The public forum featured a presentation by Rebecca Ryan, a nationally recognized futurist, which set the foundation for the forum. The attendees were divided into small groups, and six priorities gleaned from the surveys were then discussed. Each group was asked to provide action steps to implement the priorities.

Effective

Staff received positive comments from citizens regarding both the surveys and the public forum. It was truly inspiring to see over 100 citizens working together in small groups, fully engaged in conversations on priorities for the future of the City. The work completed by citizens at the public forum was presented to the Neighborhood Council as noted below, and was eventually approved by the City Commission and is now in the implementation stage.

Successful

The first order of impact was the dialogue that occurred amongst residents, visitors, and business owners regarding the long-range vision for the future of the City. To date, much of the long-range planning that had been done was reactionary in nature. Utilizing the city staff with out-reach for the survey process, the City was able to identify the core

set of beliefs that motivate the citizenry: the protection of the City's natural and historical resources, which make the City unique. These resources are a key feature for tourism, a primary economic driver for the City. While the individual motivations for this preservationist attitude may have varied amongst individuals, the end result was still the same – preserve and protect the city's irreplaceable assets.

The second order impact was the very clear message sent by citizens, which was to maintain public access to the City's many waterfront areas (including beach, inter-coastal waterway, streams through marshlands, etc). While this was not an anticipated outcome, the City had just recently completed a review of proposals for a publicly-owned waterfront property. Those proposals were rejected and new proposals are now being reviewed – with the knowledge of the citizen interest in maintaining access to the waterfront.

Following the public input phase of Charting Our Course, the information from the surveys and the public forum were provided to the City's Neighborhood Council, a newly formed advisory board. The Neighborhood Council reviewed the list of priorities, suggested action steps, and drafted a long-range plan. The plan was then presented to the City Commission and was unanimously adopted in June, 2014. City staff is now implementing the plan, which consists of short, mid-term, and long-range goals.

Cost Effective

The cost of the Charting Our Course visioning initiative was \$22,540, which includes speakers, travel, handouts, advertising, and venue preparation for public meetings. By working with staff at the International City Management Association, City staff was able

to maximize financial efficiency by coordination schedules, assignments, and other logistics for the participation of futurist Rebecca Ryan. The City also handled the marketing, physical set-up and tear-down of the City presence at events, provided the necessary background information, and conducted the field work associated with collecting and analyzing the surveys.

Adaptable

This process may easily be duplicated by other local governments looking to garner input from its citizenry. The most important component that ensured the success of the effort was the willingness of City staff to attend the events and meetings, and the willingness of residents and visitors to complete the surveys.

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New Smyrna leaders to consider 25-year priorities

NEW SMYRNA BEACH — Using the results of more than 500 surveys taken by both residents and visitors, New Smyrna Beach leaders are set to craft a plan that targets the city's top priorities for the next 25 years.

Along with the surveys, the initiative called "NSB 2039: Charting our Course" also incorporates feedback from a visioning session held in March that was attended by more than 100 residents, business and community leaders.

The No. 1 issue — by a wide margin — is protecting the troubled Indian River Lagoon, the results show.

Now it's up to the City Commission to set its future priorities during a workshop slated for 5:30 p.m. Tuesday at City Hall, 210 Sams Ave.

"I think what we're looking for is to get from the commission a consensus on what their maybe top five to 10 issues would be," City Planning Manager Gail Henrikson said.

Some of the recommendations to help protect the lagoon are to eliminate septic tanks and manage stormwater runoff. One idea was to hold an annual "hands across the lagoon" event to raise awareness about the importance the health of the estuary.

"I think anything to do with the Indian River Lagoon or removal of septic tanks is going to require some cross-agency coordination, whether it's between the city and the (New Smyrna Beach) Utilities Commission, the Health Department, the state, (Department of Environmental Protection) — could be a host of different agencies," Henrikson said.

Other top priorities listed in the surveys are the need to redevelop U.S. 1, create more jobs, preserve and protect historical resources and public properties and develop a corridor plan for rapidly growing State Road 44.

The city's Neighborhood Council, a body formed last year to bring representatives from various neighborhoods to the same table, reviewed all the recommendations from the surveys and the visioning session and set time frames they believe city officials should consider each issue. For instance, it was recommended that most efforts to improve the health of the lagoon be dealt with within the next year.

City commissioners during the Tuesday workshop will also revisit an 18-point plan developed by the New Smyrna Beach Citizens Smart Growth to improve the North Causeway.

Recommendations include eliminating some zoning classifications, placing more of an emphasis on residential growth, reducing the speed limit and allowing the use of low-speed vehicles.

Some of the group's goals for the future of the causeway are beginning to come to fruition.

The city has \$1 million budgeted to beautify the causeway, with possible upgrades including landscaped islands in the medians, new "wave pattern" crosswalks, sidewalks and shade trees.

Marty Danaher, one of the organizers of the Citizens for Smart Growth, said one of the group's wishes is to change the name of both the North Causeway neighborhood and roadway to Coronado Island.

The new moniker, he believes, would boost the fortunes of incoming developments, including a potential 200-unit condominium project at 99 N. Causeway called Isola Bella, planned by Houston-based Silvestri Investments.

"Our goal is to build a brand called Coronado Island which will help those folks be successful and make those developments successful, which of course helps everyone's property values and makes a significant impact on tax revenue," Danaher said.

Residents, visitors crafting New Smyrna's 25-year plan

NEW SMYRNA BEACH - When city officials craft an all-encompassing 25-year plan that looks at issues ranging from the environment to traffic, they won't just use feedback from full-time residents.

Visitors and part-time residents will also have their say, able to fill out surveys that ask them to list their top five priorities or concerns.

"Today's visitors are tomorrow's retirees," said Wade Mahood, a resident of Florida Avenue. "How we treat them, and what they see and the changes we make now will affect that."

Mahood was one of about a dozen residents who showed up Saturday at the Brannon Center for a meeting that served as the kick-off for the city's long-term visioning called "Charting Our Course: NSB 2039."

So far, city officials have collected about 300 surveys, said Gail Henrikson, the city's planning manager. And priorities seem to differ between visitors and full-time residents.

"It seems as though the people who are non-residents are leaning more towards the environmental (concerns) — parks, trails, Indian River Lagoon," she said. "And a lot of the people who are actual residents, those things really aren't quite as much on their radar. They're concerned more about economic development, the fiscal responsibility, the budgeting and things like that."

Randy Herman, who lives on Esther Street, said there needs to be more of a focus on developing affordable housing so people who work in the city can live there. However, he said there's a stigma attached when "low-cost" is used to describe that housing.

"I think that's another piece to our vision," Herman said. "We need some quality housing for people who are our lifeblood."

City officials listed 15 concerns on the survey, from the troubled health of the Indian River Lagoon to the appearance of the State Road 44 corridor, where commercial growth is booming.

Peggy Rivers, who lives off Quay Assisi, said her concerns about State Road 44 go beyond aesthetics.

"What concerns me is the development and the control of the development, and the traffic," she said. "The traffic coming into town already is horrendous and we're going to scare visitors away because they can't get to the beach because it takes so long with that traffic congestion."

Surveys will be handed out at other community events and can be filled out online through a link on the city's website www.cityofnsb.com.

Once the 25-year priorities have been narrowed, Rebecca Ryan, a nationally renowned "futurist," will lead a forum with city officials and residents from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. March 22 at the Brannon Center. City Manager Pam Brangaccio said also on hand at that meeting will be experts speaking on issues including the Indian River Lagoon and transportation.

"We will have basically what we're calling those provocateurs to really talk about the top five or six issues that have been identified, in terms of what are the tripwires in a community if they are not addressed," Brangaccio said.

New Smyrna looks to chart its course; Indian River Lagoon a citizen concern

NEW SMYRNA BEACH — Sally Gillespie said the seeming lack of a long-term vision for the city served as the impetus in forming a group she's a part of dedicated to heightening citizen involvement.

"We felt the city was in need of a vision, of something around which all the citizens could coalesce," said Gillespie, a life-long New Smyrna Beach resident and member for the Citizens for Smart Growth, which formed in 2012.

In the coming weeks, every citizen can have their say on issues from the environment to economic development as New Smyrna Beach officials embark on an all-encompassing effort to develop a plan that charts the city's course for the next 25 years.

"I would say this is the largest scale, long-term visioning plan that the city has done, to my knowledge," said Gail Henrikson, the city's planning manager. The initiative, called "Charting our Course: NSB 2039" started in earnest Jan. 18, when city officials handed out surveys at the Home Show and Business Expo, asking residents to list their top issues.

There were about 225 responses, and the "overwhelming" top concern was protecting the Indian River Lagoon, Henrikson said.

That response comes on the heels of [The News Journal's five-part series in December that chronicled the variety of troubles facing the lagoon.](#)

The troubled health of the lagoon, which stems from environmental problems ranging from stormwater runoff to leaking septic systems — will also be one of the focal points of a joint meeting of the governing bodies of New Smyrna, Edgewater and Oak Hill slated for 6 p.m. March 18 at Edgewater City Hall, said New Smyrna Beach City Manager Pam Brangaccio.

Protecting the lagoon was one of 15 issues New Smyrna Beach officials listed on the survey, asking residents to rank their top five.

Among the other concerns named were the redevelopment of U.S. 1, the appearance of the booming State Road 44 corridor, developing a long-range financial strategic plan and creating better paying local jobs.

The surveys will also be handed out at the Black Heritage Festival Feb. 7-9 at Pettis Park and other public settings. Surveys can be also be filled out through a link on the city's homepage at cityofnsb.com.

Residents will also be asked to rank their priorities at a kick-off meeting at 9 a.m. Saturday at the Brannon Center, 105 S. Riverside Drive.

Once the 25-year priorities have been narrowed, Rebecca Ryan, a nationally renowned “futurist,” will lead a forum with city officials and residents from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. March 22 at the Brannon Center.

“(Ryan is) really good with demographics and identifying trends that are going to be coming up,” Henrikson said.

“So she’s going to be kind of giving us the big picture of trends that are going to be affecting New Smyrna Beach, and then how that would relate to the issues that are emerging as the top issues that we need to concentrate on coming from the residents.”

The Citizens for Smart Growth last year developed a multi-pronged plan they believe will improve the North Causeway which they presented to the City Commission. Gillespie and her group now have a chance to help city officials chart a course for the future on a grander scale.

“We’re delighted, and certainly, I’m thrilled that the city has taken the lead in doing this and putting this together,” she said.


